

The Ten Commandments: The Fifth Commandment

You shall not kill. Exodus 20:13 ESV

Moving along down the list of the Ten Commandments, we get to number five this month. In the Bible, the commandment



prohibiting "killing" apparently does not include capital punishment or lethal force used in legitimate police and military operations. As we have seen in the previous commandment about authority, God gives certain authority to human representatives, and at times this civil authority is called upon to use force for the purpose of maintaining order in the world. For this reason, some translations of the Bible use the word "murder" instead of "kill" in this Fifth Commandment. Whether capital punishment or certain military actions are wise things for governments to engage in is a separate question, but it is simply important for our purposes here to distinguish between such actions and the kind of "killing" described by this Fifth Commandment.

When we hear commandment number five, we might be tempted to pat ourselves on the back. After all, most of us have never been in the situation of physically murdering someone. But as we have discovered with the previous commandments, things aren't quite so simple. It is good of course that we have never physically murdered anyone, but "killing" has a much broader meaning. Martin Luther summed it up in his Small Catechism:

We should fear and love God so that we do our neighbors no bodily harm nor cause them any suffering, but help and befriend them in every need. In this brief explanation and in his lengthier explanation of the Fifth Commandment in his Large Catechism, Martin Luther points out that it is not only murder that God prohibits, but rather "everything that may lead to murder." God knows that the inclinations of our hearts are sinful, and so this commandment against "killing" is meant to serve as "a boundary between good and evil." Luther goes on to explain:

This spirit of revenge clings to every one of us... God wants us to keep this commandment ever before our eyes as a mirror in which we see ourselves, so that we may be attentive to his will and with hearty confidence and prayer commit to him whatever wrong we suffer... Thus may we learn to calm our anger and have a patient, gentle heart, especially toward those who have given us occasion for anger, namely, our enemies.

The hard pill to swallow is that God prohibits revenge and feelings of revenge. This commandment reveals to all of us our sinful and unclean hearts and need for our Savior Jesus Christ.

We also need to be aware that "killing" and "murder" have broad definitions. We are commanded to *do our neighbors no bodily harm nor cause them any suffering*. As human beings, we possess the power not only to harm people physically, but also verbally. Our words and actions have the power to tear people down, and this Fifth Commandment applies to those situations as well. Once again, this commandment reveals to us the depths of our sin and need for Jesus Christ and his mercy.

But like other commandments, this one doesn't end with prohibiting certain activities. Spiritual insight often comes from odd places. From the time he was very young, my son developed a liking for the superhero Spiderman, and so I have become quite familiar with the story. The young man who became Spiderman, Peter Parker, is told by his uncle Ben Parker that "With great power comes great responsibility." As human beings, God has given us great power, and as Christians we know of our great responsibility.

I can think of no better way of expressing the last part of Martin Luther's explanation of this Fifth Commandment: "but help and befriend them in every need." As people who have been redeemed and reborn as God's children, God places us in the world and calls upon us to bear witness to his great love for us through our love for others. It is so tempting to lash out in anger and retaliation, but God has "a more excellent way" (1 Corinthians 12) for us to follow. As Luther writes in the Large Catechism: Therefore it is God's real intention that we should allow no man to suffer harm, but show to everyone kindness and love. I pray that we as individuals and as a congregation will continue to demonstrate this outward focus of kindness and love, rooted in the undeserved love of Jesus Christ that has been so freely given to us.

- Finished replacing 16 ceiling tiles in Fellowship Hall.



NALC Constitution Revisions, Bob Reynolds

During the 2023 NALC Convocation, several people (including myself) with backgrounds in church constitutions were invited to participate in reworking the NALC constitution, mainly with respect to separating out procedural issues from major items. My background in working with church constitutions involves rewriting or revising the constitution of our previous churches, including First Evangelical Lutheran Church of Odenton, MD (LCMS), St Timothy Lutheran Church of Naperville, IL (ELCA), St Peter's Lutheran Church of Lancaster, OH (ELCA), the Southern Ohio Synod (ELCA), and the national ELCA constitution.

This work involves creating bylaws where, at present, there are none in the constitution. Individual Sections of each major Article are considered for what is the main point of that Section and what aspects of that Section are then procedural and can be a bylaw.

For example, Article 7 covers the Biennial Convocation. Section 7.01 in its entirety states "A Convocation of the NALC shall be held biennially." Section 7.02, however, states "Delegates with voting privileges at a Convocation shall be the ordained ministers of the NALC and lay delegates representing congregations of the NALC." How the delegates are chosen and then allocated are stated in 8 separate bylaw statements, none of which existed prior to our work.

The benefit of pulling procedural aspects from a Section statement and "reducing" them to bylaws makes it much easier for subsequent Convocations to change the bylaw as needed, requiring just one majority vote of that Convocation. If bylaws were not created from the overall Section, then the constitution requires that changes to Sections requires the two-thirds

approval of TWO consecutive Convocations! This is exceptionally cumbersome and unnecessarily time-consuming.

In addition to creating bylaws from existing Sections, the format of the constitution was "not uniform", to put it mildly.

My current role on reworking the NALC constitution is that of, as I call it, "Scribe (but not Pharisee)". This involves coordinating, maintaining and integrating all suggested changes from the other members of the committee (3 ordained ministers, one member of the Executive Council, the General Secretary of NALC, with oversight by the Bishop) and cleaning up the format of all documents involved.

This is a very time-intensive role that involves extreme attention to detail, an ability to integrate concepts across multiple Articles and Sections, and an ability to figure out how MS Word works at its most extreme minute level.

We are to present a draft version of the revised constitution to the NALC Deans about October of this year, followed by presentation to the Executive Council in November, and having a final version ready to be considered for approval and adoption in time for the 2025 Convocation.







